



Trends in IPR

COMPARING IP FILINGS ACROSS LEADING ECONOMIES

- The largest economy in the world is the USA, followed by China, Japan, Germany and the United Kingdom.
- India is the 6th largest economy and is set to surpass the UK in the near future to claim the 5th spot.
- China apart, disparities in patent filings among the other economies are much higher than disparities in trademark filings see Fig. 1 below.

THE GLOBALISATION OF IP: Filing Abroad

PATENTS

- Filing abroad reflects a desire to commercialise technology in foreign markets. The US leads in this regard, followed by Japan and Germany (in 2016, corresponding statistics of patent applications filed overseas were 2,26,315, 1,96,215 and 1,03,498 respectively). In contrast, Chinese residents filed 52,428 applications overseas and Indians filed 12,638 (of these nearly 70% were filed in the US).
- Interestingly, if one looks at the number of patent applications originating from China, 96% of these were filed at the Chinese Patent Office in 2016. In the case of India, the percentage of applications heading to the national office vis-à-vis foreign offices was nearly even the figures were 47.5% and 52.5% respectively. For the US and Japan, filings abroad constituted 43% of total applications.




Fig. 3 PERCENTAGE SHARE OF NON-RESIDENT APPLICANTS




Fig. 5 PUBLISHED PATENT APPLICATIONS - TOP 5 FIELDS OF TECHNOLOGY

TRADEMARKS

• At most offices, trademark applications are filed mainly by residents seeking protection within their domestic jurisdiction. In 2016, the share of non-resident trademark applications (class counts) worldwide was 20.2%.




Fig. 6 PERCENTAGE SHARE OF NON-RESIDENT APPLICANTS

• Since 2006, German applicants have been filing the most applications abroad. In 2016, German filing activity abroad reached an equivalent application class count of about 2.04 million, followed by the U.S. (1.22 million), the U.K. (1.07 million) and Italy (922,851).

• WIPO's World Intellectual Property Indicators 2017 reveals that **62.5% of global filing activity covered 'goods' classes and 37.5% covered 'services'** (per the Nice Classification). The share of services classes for China was 34% and for the EU 37.3%; but the US and Japan showed a higher distribution for services classes at 40% and 49.8% respectively. India was nearly 10 percentage points behind the global average at 27.4%.
